# Zoo Commissary Dramatic Play

### <u>Learning Objectives</u>

Students will be better able to:

- Take on the role of a Zoo worker to prepare food for animals
- Follow multi-step directions to prepare food for animals
- Use picture clues to prepare meals for different zoo animals
- Practice fine motor skills like chopping, cutting, weighing, etc.

#### <u>Materials needed:</u>

- scissors, glue, 3-ring binder to make the recipe book (optional), laminating pages (optional), 3-hole punch (optional)
- stuffed animals, play food, and kitchen utensils for play



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### <u>Assemble your Commissary Cookbook</u>

For each copy of your cookbook, follow these steps:

- I. Print off pages 3–7, including multiple copies of page 4 (the recipe page). Make sure to print one for each stuffed animal in your classroom.
- 2. Cut and glue the pictures from pages 5–7 onto your recipe pages based on which animals you have in your classroom and what steps you want your students to follow.
- 3. Laminate, hole punch, and place recipes into a 3-ring binder.
- 4. Make multiple cookbooks to provide multiple students opportunities to play the role of a Commissary Worker.

The one on the left is for a rabbit and the one on the right is for a lion.




### Set up your Commissary Dramatic Play Area




