## ACTIVITY 2: How can I practice storytelling like a Videographer?

- 1. Option A
  - a. Watch the following unedited videos, also called "B-roll," that Roshan filmed.

  - b. Select one of the B-roll videos to tell a story.
  - c. Write a script or narrative to go along with the video based on what it depicts and the story you want to tell. Keep in mind:
    - i. Subject— What is your story about? The animal or habitat or climate?
    - ii. Audience- Who do you expect to watch your story?
    - iii. Message— What do you want your viewers to take away from your story?
    - iv. Emotion— How do you want your viewers to feel after watching?
- 2. Option B
  - a. Explore the wildlife near your home or neighborhood.
  - b. Using a cellphone, tablet, or camera, film your own story about local wildlife.
  - c. Remember to think about the subject, audience, and message of your story.
  - d. When filming, consider the following:
    - i. Will you film one long segment or multiple shots edited together?
    - ii. Does your story have background music? What type of music?
    - iii. How will you bring focus to a specific thing? Using zoom or framing?
